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UXO Lao adds more UXO clearance teams

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The Lao National Unexploded Ordnance Programme (UXO Lao) has added another 15 UXÓ clearance teams after the programme increased the scope of its clearance plan.

The new teams will include five in Khammuan, five in Savannakhet and five in Attapeu provinces as clearance demand is higher in these provinces, Director of the National Regulatory Authority (NRA) for the UXO/Mine Action Sector, Mr Phoukhieo Chanthasomboun reported at a meeting last week.

Last year, the programme cleared a total of 2,500 hectares and this year plans to increase that figure to more than 3,200 hectares or a 28 percent increase, Mr Phoukhieo said.

Luang Prabang plans to clear 130 hectares, while 161 hectares are targeted for clearance in Huaphan, 600 hectares in Xieng Khuang, 413 hectares in Khammuan, 710 hectares in Savannakhet, 402 hectares in Saravan, 220 hectares in Xekong, 170 hectares in Champassak and 440 hectares in Attapeu.

Laos, Vietnam speed up plans for Vientiane-Hanoi expressway

Laos and Vietnam have agreed to take the next steps to start construction of an expressway linking the capitals of Vientiane and Hanoi this year.

The agreement was reached at a bilateral meeting held in Hanoi on Tuesday between Laos' Ministry of Public Works and Transport and Vietnam's Ministry of Transport, the Voice of Vietnam (VOV) reported, citing the Vietnam News Agency.

The ministries agreed to seek investment and support, firstly to carry out a feasibility study for the expressway.


A senior official at the Lao ministry's Road and Bridge Department told Vientiane Times yesterday that a primary study had already been carried out.

An official at the centre, Ms Junko Nukiyama, reported yesterday via social media that Laos was one of the winners chosen from among Cambodia, Laos, Myanmar and Vietnam to receive the award under the Mekong Tourism Award 2016, arranged by the Asean-Japan

She said the centre had selected five outstanding tour products offered in the four countries as the winners of the Mekong Tourism Award 2016.

The categories comprised New Destination, Ecotourism, Unique Tour, Exchange Programme and Jury's Special Award, aiming to highlight the Visit ASEAN@50 that commemorates the 50th anniversary of the establishment of Asean and to promote tourism in the region in 2017.

The province has regularly been voted as 'Best City' by readers of the UK's Wanderlust travel magazine. Luang Prabang has received the award on seven occasions, in 2006, 2007, 2008, 2010, 2011, 2012 and 2015.

The Mekong Tourism Award 2015 also selected Laos' world heritage sites of Luang Prabang and Vat Phou Champassak as award winners last year.
